	There has been no incidents of note since the last meeting.
	Road Safety
	There have been no reportable road accidents since the last meeting.
	Local officers have and will continue to carry out high visibility patrols to improve road safety.
	The issues in relation to vehicles parked on the A809 near to the Devil's Pulpit are still ongoing, however appear to have abated over recent months, as a result of the poorer weather. Officers will continue to monitor this area as is believed that the better weather will see a return of high visitor numbers.
	There have been a number of meetings and conversations held over the winter months involving all or some of the various parties, who find themselves involved in the issues at this location. From a policing point of view, vehicles parked dangerously or causing an obstruction, as before, will be uplifted by the police and the owners charged accordingly.
	The actions of people requiring rescue from the gorge will now be subject of police investigation. If it is found their actions constitute the Common Law Crime of Reckless Conduct, they will be reported to the Procurator Fiscal at Stirling for consideration of prosecution. This crime is committed by someone whose actions show utter disregard for what the consequences of the action in question may be, leading to injury. OR Circumstances are such as to give rise to a reasonable inference that persons may be injured. Instances leading to persons being charged with this crime will be publicised and it is hoped that this tougher stance will make people think more about what they are doing when they attend the gorge.



Theft

Since the last meeting here has been an attempted theft from a house within the village. There are still issues in the Strathblane/Dumgoyne/Stockiemuir area, where remote sheds and outbuilding are still being targeted.

Once again I would ask everyone to remain vigilant in relation to their home and vehicles.

There has also been a theft by shoplifting from the CO-OP.

•Reduce crime and the fear of crime by providing the right information, to the right people, at the right time.

•Encourage people to think about safety and security for themselves, their neighbours and their community.

•Improve community cohesion and well-being by supporting communities to develop 'their watch, their way'.

Police Message of Local Residents

It is getting to the time when it gets darker earlier which can make it easier for thieves to target your property if they can see that nobody is home. We need your help to make it make it harder for the thieves so please consider the following:

- Use timer switches on lights and radios to make it look as if your home is occupied.
