## **Antisocial Behaviour**

On the night of the fireworks display we were on foot around the village. After the display there were a lot of youths hanging around the park drinking and letting off fireworks to the annoyance of nearby residents. We were still on foot moving them on and taking alcohol from under age youths. Later there was a report of youths within the primary school. No damage was caused to the school however there was a lot of broken glass and cans lying in the playground.

On 27<sup>th</sup> October 2018 a male was found to be in possession of cannabis.



## **Road Safety**

On 15<sup>th</sup> November 2018 a 3 vehicle RTC occurred on the A81 near to the distillery. No injuries were sustained however a driver of one of the vehicles was issued with a Conditional offer of fixed penalty for careless driving.

Local officers have continued to carry out high visibility patrols in the area. Traffic Officers have also been in the villages and carrying out both high visibility unmarked patrols in the area.

Please check and maintain your vehicle for road worthiness. The winter weather causes roads and driving conditions to be hazardous. This includes ensuring that vehicle windscreens are defrosted and you have a full view of the road ahead prior to driving off. On that note, please do not defrost the windscreen by leaving your engine running unattended on the road or driveway.

## **DEVIL'S PULPIT**

The issues in relation to vehicles parked on the A809 near to the Devil's Pulpit are still ongoing. Officers will continue to monitor this area on a daily basis.

The new bollards placed on both roadways have, in our opinion, assisted greatly with the issue of inconsiderate parking on both roadways.



## **Theft**

On 26<sup>th</sup> October 2018 the metal gates of the cemetery were stolen.

On 12<sup>th</sup> November 2018 a theft by HB occurred in the Croy Cunningham Steadings. The recent HBs in the area have been commercial premises but this was to a domestic dwelling.

On 17<sup>th</sup> November 2018 a burnt out vehicle was discovered on Cameron Muir. It is thought to be a stolen vehicle however this is still to be confirmed.

We have carried out road checks in the area recently to try and catch/deter travelling criminals. These checks will be continued.

## **Police Message of Local Residents**

Recently the clocks went back an hour to mark the end of British Summer time. This also marked the start of the darker nights which can make it easier for thieves to target your property if they can see that nobody is home. We need your help to make it make it harder for the thieves so please consider the following:

- Use timer switches on lights and radios to make it look as if your home is occupied.
- Ensure all doors and windows are secure when you leave and when you go to bed.
- If possible use secure lighting at the front and back of your property.
- Make sure all garden tools and ladders are locked away when not being used. Don't give the thieves the tools to break into your house.
- Use a good quality lock on any garden sheds and outhouses.
- Make a note of all makes, models and serial numbers of expensive items in your home.

- •Improve community cohesion and well-being by supporting communities to develop 'their watch, their way'.
- •Work in partnership with national and local service providers to develop more resilient communities that are better prepared against threats, intentional or unintentional, such as crime or extreme weather.

The experience of Neighbourhood Watch throughout Scotland and elsewhere across the world is that members of Rural Watch Scotland will be less likely than non-members in the rural community to be a victim of crime.
